COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH



Since starting in 2019, the Hudswell Community Speed Watch team have deployed 48 times and observed 961 vehicles passing the selected venue. Of those 46 were caught speeding in excess of the upper limit and North Yorkshire Police were informed and took action.

That equates to a 5% "capture" rate. Certain areas of the village have been highlighted as "black spots" by the volunteers and their efforts continue.

Remember, the scheme is not designed to catch as many speeders as possible. It is to reduce speeds and community fears, making drivers aware that excessive speed within posted limits is socially unacceptable and comes with consequences.

National Trust Yorkshire Dales NEWS FROM THE WOODS – AUTUMN 2021

Autumn is coming fast now; the signs are everywhere. House martins were soaring above the woods yesterday. Fledglings from the eaves of Hudswell Village Hall joined several hundred birds moving south. Feeding on flies above Calfhall Wood they topped up the fat stores that will power their imminent journey to Africa. Where in Africa remains a mystery, we don't have the technology yet (trackers with batteries that are light enough) to follow their migration without influencing their survival. Sightings in Africa are apparently few and far between and one theory proposes that house martins spend months on the wing feeding at high altitude above rainforests. Like so many species, these remarkable birds need our help. When they return to the UK simply tolerating them while they nest on our property is a big help. Yes, it can be a bit messy and noisy, but to have nature on the doorstep (or windowsill) is a real privilege, and presumably why many of us enjoy living in the countryside. If we keep pushing nature away, at some point it won't return. So, on behalf of house martins, a big thank you to everyone that allows them to nest on their property, well done!

Descending now to ground level, we have been busy in the woods this summer. Regular jobs such as pulling invasive Himalayan balsam and clearing litter have been interspersed with the larger task of moving bags of crushed stone to areas where footpaths have spread. Our paths have experienced an increase in use over the last year and in the wetter months, as walkers try to avoid the mud, popular routes get wider and wider and muddier and muddier. We aim to narrow and surface the worst sections but as always at Hudswell Woods transporting materials to the work site is 80% of the task. Nevertheless, with help from Volunteers, the wider Ranger team, a couple of wheelbarrows and two quad bikes we have moved 40 tonnes of crushed stone to the worst areas. Path repairs will continue over the coming autumn and winter. Most of the paths will remain unsurfaced and that is very much our long-term intention; we are not turning the area in to a park. So, in winter it will still be necessary to wear sturdy walking boots or a trusty pair of wellies.

Contractors have been on site in the last few weeks, renewing fencing at Round Howe. This all ties in with our autumn grazing of Belted Galloways on the riverside grassland. Our monitoring shows that habitat quality at Round Howe is improving in response to low numbers of grazing cattle combined with long rest periods when no grazing takes place. There is no other way to replicate the positive impact the cattle have. Research shows if we make space for nature, and restore or mimic natural processes, such as light grazing and browsing of the woodland edge with hardy cattle breeds, some wildlife returns quite quickly. Other species and interactions take time to recover, there is no fixed end point to habitat restoration, but with time and patience (from us) nature will respond. Nature conservation faces many big challenges, so it is especially rewarding to see how small changes in land management can have big positive effects.
