

Please first consult the '95 Alive' Partnership Speed Management Protocol for York and North Yorkshire, which will provide you with all the information you need before you make a complaint about speeding in your community, or whether your complaint is better addressed somewhere else. Please provide a suitable email address – we will communicate with you by email when such an address is provided. If you are aware of a road in York or North Yorkshire which you feel is hazardous (for example, you've had a near miss and you feel that the conditions of the road were a factor), you can report it via the Roadwise website. BEWARE OF TELEPHONE FRAUDSTERS

The Protector: They love to pose as the police, or someone from bank security. One of their favourite tricks is to say your account is at risk and you need to move all your money urgently.

TIP Don't do it. Cut them off, wait a few minutes, then if you think it necessary call your Bank on the number you have for your account (not the number given to you by the fraudster) to check if it is a genuine call.

<u>The Impersonator</u>: They pretend to be from your friendly gas/electricity/phone/software /internet Service Provider. They'll say there's a fee you need to pay or a refund you're due, so they just need to check your bank details.

TIP See if they're genuine by finding a number for them online and call them back. Never sign in to Online Banking or give them your card or account details for a 'refund'. They should have your bank details already, or ask for a cheque instead.

<u>Mr. Good News</u>: They like to cheer people up with a nice surprise, saying you've won a big money prize or inherited a substantial sum from a long-lost relative. You just need to pay a modest admin fee, then you'll be rich.

TIP If you've never bought a ticket you can't be a winner. So, if they want money before your 'windfall' can be paid, ask to be told in writing and then check out the company online. Better safe than sorry.

The Savvy Tipster: They'll spin you a line about how you've been specially chosen, and here's a brilliant opportunity to make a small fortune if you send money quickly.

TIP Say it's not a good time to talk, hang up and do some homework. Check them out online with the FCA's 'Scam smart' warning list. If you feel the investment is worthwhile, call them on a number you have sourced yourself.

I understand that you are the Parish Clerk for Downholme. Would you please be able to add a note to your website or newsletter to let as many people as possible know that Downholme has now been upgraded to fibre broadband.

To check what speed is available to you then please enter your telephone number into the availability checker http://www.dslchecker.bt.com/adsl/adslchecker.welcome

The next steps will be to contact your service provider and place an order with them for fibre optic broadband.

Just to let you know that not all service providers are offering fibre in your area and you may need to use a comparison website to see who is offering the service. Just enter your postcode into http://www.broadbandchoices.co.uk/ and select the 'fibre' tab.

Superfast broadband will help improve access to jobs, allow local companies to compete in the global marketplace, create new opportunities for local people in the way they work, learn and enjoy their leisure time, and help young people make use of educational resources online.

Premises that will not benefit from fibre deployment will be reached with variety of alternative technologies such as wireless or satellite.

National Trust Yorkshire Dales NEWS FROM THE WOODS - AUTUMN 2017

Once again we were treated to a dry spring and early summer, indeed the summer showed some promise until we reached July. Accordingly, butterfly numbers were up nationally and this was reflected at Hudswell Woods with an abundance of ringlet, speckled wood, red admiral and small skipper. The odd painted lady was also recorded which is a butterfly that travels to us from Southern Europe, along with an influx of marmalade hoverflies, also from the continent. The marsh thistle and creeping thistle on the bank that runs down to and around the oak tree and Andrew Watson's bench were alive with insect life through June and July. I appreciate thistles are not everyone's cup of tea and they are routinely sprayed or mown off, but they are an excellent source of nectar attracting many insects, and later in the year their seeds are enjoyed by marsh tit and goldfinch.

Our Easter Egg Hunt this year was a sell out and our wild flower photography workshop, kindly run as a fundraiser by local professional photographer and teacher Ian Short, was also very well attended (for anyone interested there's an autumn colour photography workshop on the $22^{\rm nd}$ October, details are on Hudswell noticeboard). Our events in general have been well supported this year although the bats could have put in more of an appearance on our bat walk at the end of August. A cold hail storm earlier in the day seemed to influence the availability of food on the wing so any bats we did see were not feeding in one area for long. The daubenton bats that feed above (and occasionally scoop insects from the surface of) the calmer sections of the Swale put on a reasonable show and saved the day. Nature doesn't always perform on cue, although saying that the kingfishers have again entertained visitors on the riverside grassland. They have fledged two broods of youngsters over the summer, continuing to carry food in to their riverbank nest chamber well in to August.

Easily the most exciting news is the welcome arrival of 5 Belted Galloway cattle to carry forward our conservation grazing plans. As I write this they are currently grazing off the aftermath of the hay crop taken from our top field off Hudswell Lane, and they also have the run of the adjoining bank compartment. On this woodland edge area they are busy disturbing the ground (which enables flower seed to germinate), browsing off some saplings and grazing the herb rich sward. Over time this light grazing will create a richer habitat of wild flowers and maintain a varied scrubby edge to the woodland, ideal for insects and birds. By the end of the month the Belties will be heading down to the riverside pasture to do their good work there, and following on from that we hope they will also graze around Round Howe. Belted Galloway do have a reputation for being ideal on conservation sites with high visitor numbers, they generally have a placid nature and an endearing quality. We are appealing to visitors, especially those walking dogs, to follow the guidance on the signs displayed at gates and to act responsibly.

Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority NEWS FROM THE DALES – AUTUMN 2017

As summer draws to its close our most busiest period of activity in the annual Ranger cycle shows no signs of letting up! Swaledale has seen a flurry of activity which has kept all our rangers and many Dales Volunteers entertained.

The first of our major projects this summer came about after surveys of the Coast to Coast, courtesy of the Wainwright Society, highlighted the degradation of a section of the route in Upper Swaledale near Keld. Although not an official National Trail the National Park Authority recognises the Coast to Coast as an important Long Distance Route of great benefit and value to the communities of Swaledale. The section which needed attention is to the east of Keld in an area known as Swinner Gill before the route emerges onto the open fell of Gunnerside Common. The route had become braided – where people are unsure of which way to go so numerous different tracks develop – and also the ever present erosion had created impassable sections in a few locations. As a popular route with visitors and local walkers alike it was clearly a priority to tackle.

After much scratching of heads about how we would access and get materials to the remote site we planned to stick to what we know and lay a stone flagged surface as can be seen on many high routes in the Pennines. Although labour intensive to lay, the stone flags create a hard wearing and long lasting surface which is clear to navigate. The main benefit of this is that it then allows the braided sections and erosion to recover and thus improve the vegetative cover, reducing further damage to the peatland habitat. Obviously it also means walkers don't get so easily lost or such muddy boots!

After a day and a half of airlifting by helicopter followed by nearly 100 work days over 14 days Rangers and Dales Volunteers have managed to lay out 220 linear metres of flagstones and around 35 steps. There were also retaining walls to rebuild and piped culverts to install. The end result is fantastic.





The second and ongoing project of mine is the creation of The Swale Trail – a 20km cycle route aimed at families who want an introduction to mountain biking. The route will of course be available to all those who may want to walk, run, ride a horse or bike but also those with limited mobility will have new routes to explore. Using existing routes the trail is being improved in some areas to make it more suitable to its intended users with new surfaces, way marking and promotion.

The route lies between Reeth and Keld and roughly follows the river Swale. Around 12 km is truly off road – the rest uses the quiet lanes and back roads of Swaledale. As the routes passes through villages such as Gunnerside there are plenty of options to take short cuts and build up to completing the whole trail in one go.

We hope to have the trail completed by next year with a launch event planned for Easter time. I do hope that those of you "down dale" will find it a great route you can use to explore "up dale".
