#### **COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH**

... it's coming to Hudswell & Downholme!



Community Speed Watch is a scheme designed to support local communities to improve road safety by allowing residents to address speed concerns in their community with the support of North Yorkshire Police. This is achieved by enabling Community Residents to report to the Police the details of speeding vehicles in specific areas where speed is of concern. These speed monitoring reports enable the police to:

- Send advisory letters to the registered owners with the aim of informing them of their speed in excess of the limit
- Support Community Residents in delivering schemes where speeding is of a specific concern to the community

The scheme is not designed to catch as many speeders as possible. It is to reduce speeds and community fears, making drivers aware that excessive speed within posted limits is socially unacceptable.

## HUDSWELL COMMUNITY PUB - THE GEORGE AND DRAGON 2018 IN A NUTSHELL

Hudswell's multi-award-winning pub has had a busy and rewarding 2018 with several new projects coming to fruition over the year.

The staff, under Stuart and Melissa Miller, have had their hard work rewarded by achieving the accolade of the 2018 Yorkshire Pub of the Year Award for the third year running. This just goes to show how hard work, community support and continuing high standards are appreciated not just by the village it serves but also by the county and country beyond.

The shareholders' Board of Directors have authorised three major new projects over the past year which can be summed up as Bees, Trees and Wees! In reverse order, a major investment has been made in improving Disabled Access and Toilets plus better storage and seating on the back patio, means that in the very near future more customers will be able to access and enjoy the pub's stunning views over Swaledale. Many thanks to contractor Rob Petche for his sensitive, first class build which should be finished early this Spring.

Four directors are involved in caring for HCP bee hives: there are now 5 beehives! With help from The National Park, the hives have been sited in the pub grounds to the north of the community allotments. In February 2019, the hives were moved into the lower field, where we hope they will continue in our production of award-winning bee products. In only our second year, our honey crop provided The Little Shop with honey sales of c£350 profit! And first prize in the Richmond Bee-keepers' Association Annual Show for our light, clear honey!



Finally, you may have noticed that access to and from the pub to the Richmond/Downholme path has altered quite significantly. The stile has been replaced with steps and the footpath moved to the field's western perimeter, to protect everyone from our active bee colony. The nearby field has been planted with nearly 200 deciduous saplings to form a small plantation which, it is planned, will be coppiced to provide timber for garden use and, possibly, charcoal production. The HCP thanks Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust and The Woodland Trust for

financial help and technical advice on this project. The added biodiversity benefit and selection of species as bee food has been taken into account. The project was completed with significant help from Richmond's Just the Job Task Force, whose team (including 6 refugees living locally) cleared the field prior to planting. Several shareholders pitched in to help with this onerous task: they will hopefully be rewarded with the multifarious fruits of their labours in the future!

All in all, another great year in the annals of The George and Dragon, Yorkshire's first community pub! Come along and see what we are up to.

### National Trust Yorkshire Dales NEWS FROM THE WOODS - SPRING 2019

Apart from the last few weeks we have had a very dry winter, and even now one doesn't have to dig down far to find dry soil. This dry weather has also been enjoyed by some of our local wildlife, especially barn owls which struggle to hunt in very wet conditions. There have been several sightings locally around Hudswell village and up on Downholme Moor, and many more sightings across the Dales. I have easily seen more barn owls in the last six months than I have in the last six years. Quite often people have stopped driving and pulled over to watch these birds. It's always enjoyable to see barn owls and it's also good to see that many people are prepared to stop whatever they are doing and take 5 minutes to appreciate these wonderful birds.

Closer to home we've had 8 Belted Galloways on the grassland around Round Howe and on the riverside. The cattle have done an excellent job over winter helping us progress our grassland restoration. The sward has been grazed quite closely in places and it'll be interesting to see which flowers take advantage now that some of the coarse grass has been eaten off. At the same time however we are keen to keep some areas of tussock, thistle and bramble. These are the areas that are, amongst other things, great for insects and small mammals to overwinter. I've said it before in this update but nature loves all those bits that we think are messy, so we are not overly concerned about our conservation work being neat and tidy.

On that note we are also very pleased that one hedgerow on the top field has been left uncut. The idea is to encourage a slightly taller and wider hedge to grow, and we know from existing research that this supports a greater number and variety of birds. Cutting hedges over a three year rotation in sections has also been shown to have significant benefits, doubling hawthorn and blackthorn flower (and the resulting crop of haws and sloes in the winter). These little things all help our pollinators which are in drastic decline. This decline can be difficult to visualise, however, when we are guiding walks or leading groups we have found, for a certain generation, a simple question helps people realise the growing absence of flying insects: when was the last time you had to clear dead insects from the front of your car? 30 or 40 years ago you couldn't do a motorway journey without amassing a huge collection of dead insects on the number plate, lights and bonnet, now this is rarely experienced, which even if you like a clean car is difficult to accept as a good thing!

Well, the blackthorn is in flower and signs of spring are everywhere. The first warblers are returning from Africa and oystercatcher, lapwing, curlew and skylark are moving apace back to their breeding grounds. Skeins of whooper swan have also been seen flying north. As a keen birder I'm quite excited by what the next few months hold. I'll often be out at dawn in May and June undertaking bird surveys in the Dales. It is well worth making time to get out and behold spring in all its glory.
